Message from the Executive Director, Cathie Lancaster

CASA of Merced County aspires to improve the lives of children in foster care by providing trained volunteers to advocate for their best interests in the foster care system and to prepare them for the future. We currently have 100 advocates serving 110 children, with 11 future advocates being sworn in June. With a CASA, children in foster care have someone who will care and listen to them. Their CASA meets with them on a regular basis and speaks up for their best interests. It is amazing how much these volunteers accomplish for our children! Please read **Spotlight on an Advocate** for a real life example of how one of our own CASAs helped improve the life of a Merced County youth in foster care.

I am always happy to share exciting news about CASA of Merced County and this newsletter is no exception! Keep reading for a small sample of what we have been doing over the past few months.

First, I would like to thank everyone that participated in CASA Derby Night on March 24; whether you donated an item, a baked good, your time or were an attendee, you helped to make our night a success and we cannot thank you enough! Our speaker this year was former foster youth Raquel, who told her heart-moving story about being in foster care as a teenager. Raquel shared how her life would have been different if she had a CASA; she stated, "I believe every youth should have the advocacy of a CASA volunteer. CASA volunteers can leave the most positive impact on children." I think we all agree with Raquel.

I would like to welcome two new employees to our CASA staff, Charissa Beardsley and Whitney Cornish. Charissa joined CASA in November as our Family Connections Coordinator. Charissa's goal is to provide permanency for foster youth by connecting them with as many appropriate relatives and non-relatives, as possible, and assist them in developing lasting relationships. Whitney joined CASA in March as our Early Childhood Specialist / Advocate Coordinator. This is a brand new position for CASA of Merced County. Whitney will provide direct services to early childhood aged children and their caregivers as well as supervise advocates specifically assigned to these young children. We are very happy to have Charissa and Whitney join our CASA family.

During the past few months, we have welcomed several new members to our Board of Directors: Dena Traina, Natasha Crivelli, Wendy Spencer, Uday Bali, Emily Haden and Steve Tietjen. CASA sadly said good-bye to Stephen Jones and John Carlisle who had been on the CASA Board of Directors since we were in the planning stages. None of our work could be accomplished without the vision, support, and generosity of our Board of Directors.

In September, we are going to have a new type of fundraiser – a No Show Fundraiser. Look for more information in your mailboxes this September. Our fund raising events are very important; the proceeds from these events help us recruit, train and develop advocates to help the neglected and abused foster youth of Merced County.

Message from Vice President Henry Strength

No one likes to think child abuse exists in their community. However, sadly, it does exist in every community in America. Here in Merced County in 2017, over 549 children were found by the courts to have been abused or neglected by their families. When that happens, the child may enter foster care, which can be a disorienting, frightening and unsettling experience for any age child. As we observe Child Abuse Prevention Month, let us recommit ourselves to ending the vicious cycle of abuse, and to stand up for every child too young to speak for themselves.

One of the most effective ways to do this is by becoming a CASA volunteer. We are thankful that 154 children in foster care in Merced County have a Court Appointed Special Advocate, a CASA, to help guide and advocate for them in the judicial and child welfare system.

Research shows that children in foster care, who have a CASA, live happier, healthier lives as adults than children in foster care who have not had the benefit of a CASA's support.

At Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) of Merced County, we believe that all children in foster care deserve a CASA who can help them to understand their situation and can advocate fiercely on their behalf. Spotlight on an Advocate—Elisa Pouncey

Her father was a high school Spanish teacher and tennis coach and spent a lot of time on the court with Elisa. As big fans of tennis, they went to New York to watch the U.S. Open; Elisa has also been to Wimbledon and the French Open!

Elisa attended UC Berkeley where she met her husband of 38 years who is from Merced. While attending college as a psychology major she played on the first UC Berkeley girl's rugby team. Elisa and her husband have two sons and has one grandson. Fortunately, her boys all live within two hours of Merced, so she gets to see them often.

Now that Elisa is retired, she keeps busy with volunteer activities, home improvements and travel. She calls herself "Support Services" and is happy to help family, friends and organizations who need volunteers.

Elisa has friends who are advocates and others who are social workers. Those friends thought that her personality and skill set would fit in well with CASA. The big selling point for Elisa in becoming a CASA was the statistic that Merced County CASA has a high percentage of youths graduating from high school. She believes that education is crucial to our youth's success.

He recently told his caregiver "Elisa is my person, she is always there for me and I love her!" She is very grateful that her youth is able to trust her considering the difficulties in his life, they both see proof positive that a foster youth needs just one constant person in their life to make a difference.



Elisa is proud to share that her youth will be graduating from high school in June (something that did not appear to be likely a year ago) and has been accepted into college!
