Spotlight on an advocate

Rita was born and raised in Santa Clara. Sixty years ago, the semiconductor industry had not yet taken root in the Santa Clara Valley,



so when she was born, the Valley was not yet known by the name she hates and refuses to use: "Silicon Valley". When she grew up, the Valley was an idyllic community with orchards, clean air, good schools, and affordable housing.

Rita is the youngest of ten children. The kids would play baseball in their backyard, ride their bikes all day, swim at the numerous community pools and slide on cardboard boxes down the creek bed near their house. Rita loved to read books borrowed from the library's bookmobile that toured the neighborhood during the summer.

Rita spent nearly 28 years as a Deputy District Attorney with Merced County District Attorney's Office. For more than 8 of those years, she was the sole prosecutor of child molestation cases. In January 2016, four years after retiring, she saw a newspaper ad seeking CASA volunteers. She felt drawn to, once again, work with abused and neglected children, albeit in a far different capacity.

She began working with her CASA child, a five-year-old adorable little boy, in April 2016. She enjoys taking him to
