## Spotlight on an Advocate: Michelle McBride



Michelle grew up in Madera, CA but was born in the Philippines. When she was about a year old, she was adopted and brought to the United States. As a young girl she was very active in 4H and FFA where she raised and showed beef cattle. Michelle went to Merced Junior College and then on to Fresno State where she majored in Ag Business. Prior to becoming a CASA Volunteer, she worked in the equine feed sales, where she managed three Western States. Michelle's hobbies include: showing horses - she has been competing for the last 3 years, being a director for the San Joaquin Paint horse club, and water skiing.

Michelle has two grown children who are both Fresno State graduates like herself. She currently lives in Los Banos with her husband and they have a successful business together. They have two grandchildren along with an Australian Shepherd named Chance.

Becoming a CASA Volunteer had been on Michelle's mind for many years. She had always wondered in what ways she could help out in her community. Years prior she had attended an Information Session for CASA, but was not able to commit at that time. Things changed and she was ready to help the children in the foster care system. So, she completed her application and training and became an Advocate in June of 2018.

Michelle had two memorable moments with her CASA kiddos. The first was the initial meeting with the children, getting to know who them and simply bonding. Next was when she took her CASA kiddo to the CASA Christmas Party. At the party, it was the first time her kiddo had ever seen Santa. The look on her kiddo's face after meeting Santa and receiving the gifts was truly a magical moment.

Michelle believes that children need an adult who will be in their lives constantly; someone the child can count on to always be there for them. She believes that if you are going to do something, then you need to make sure you follow through with it. She states "Let's face it, life gets in the way at times, but all children need is an adult to help them navigate through this messy world".

Michelle's advice to new advocates is "take a deep breath, take notes, listen to the child and most important – be present for them. Enjoy the time, you are making a difference in their life and in our community".
